

ROBIN RADIN

Robin Radin is Associate Director of the Program on International Financial Systems at Harvard Law School. He lectures, writes and consults on financial regulation, financial transactions and financial business strategy in Japan and elsewhere in Asia. He is a creator and principal organizer of the "Symposium on Building the Financial System of the 21st Century: An agenda for Japan and the U.S.", which since 1998 has annually brought together financial leaders to discuss shared concerns. During eight years of residence in Tokyo as an officer of Morgan Stanley and CS First Boston (1988-96), Mr. Radin played an active role in promoting financial system liberalization, including advising the US Treasury Department on negotiating the landmark US-Japan Financial Services Agreement signed in January 1995.

Since his graduation from Harvard Law School in 1979, Mr. Radin has had a career in law and business management, holding positions in Tokyo and Hong Kong at CS First Boston as Managing Director and General Counsel for Asia-Pacific (1992-96); in Tokyo at Morgan Stanley as Chief Counsel for Asia-Pacific (1987-92); and in New York at Marubeni America Corporation as Senior Counsel (1982-87) and at Cleary, Gottlieb, Steen & Hamilton as an Associate (1979-82). Since September 2000, Mr. Radin has been President & CEO of CropTech Corporation, a biotech company that is in the process of commercializing its patented therapeutic protein manufacturing technology, based on the use of transgenic tobacco.

Prior to entering the legal profession, Mr. Radin was the founder and director of the Program on Japanese Studies, and taught Japanese and Chinese history, at the University of Miami in Coral Gables, Florida (1972-76). His preparation for an academic career in Japanese history started at the University of Chicago and extended through graduate training at the University of California at Berkeley; as well as graduate study and research at Kyoto University, Tokyo University and Tokyo University of Education.

Among various public service activities, he serves as a member of the Board of Directors of The Japan Society of Boston and as a member of the Program Advisory Committee of Japan Society Inc. in New York.
